



Children Drawing Rainbows to Offer Hope to Others

Why are people drawing rainbows?

- Children are drawing rainbows to make people feel better about the news.
- Rainbows occur after it has rained and the sun begins to come out again.

Have you seen all the rainbow drawings in people's windows, too? They've been cropping up everywhere. Well, many children in the UK are drawing them to brighten people's days.

It's been a busy time recently with schools having to close due to coronavirus. Many children, though, are trying to give hope to others.

They're colouring or painting rainbows. They then stick the rainbows in a place where passersby can see them. This can be in front windows that face onto a street.

A group called 'Chase the Rainbow' is encouraging people to take part. They want as many people as possible to draw rainbows.

Families are also sharing their rainbow drawings on social media. It's happening around the world too.

In Italy, people are drawing rainbows and displaying them so everyone can see. Rainbow drawings often have the message 'everything will be OK' written on them.

People are doing lots of other things to help people in need. **Volunteers** are going shopping for those who can't go out to get food at the moment. They then place the food on people's doorsteps when they deliver it.

Some supermarkets have introduced special hours. This is where supermarkets open just for **key workers** and older people to get what they need.

In London, **professional** musicians did a free concert to entertain **self-isolating** people. They played on the street outside these people's homes.

Ex-footballer Gary Neville has opened his hotel for people working at the hospitals in Manchester.

Some people are becoming pen pals. This is where people send messages to someone asking them how they're doing. They keep sending messages so people can stay in touch.

key workers People who have to go to their workplace to help others.

professional People who are doing something for a living.

self-isolating People who are having to stay inside to help stop a virus spreading.
